CAMAS URBAN TREE PROGRAM

It will be a <u>new</u> program, not a singular code change. The tree program touches every city department, and responds to tree protection concerns/questions within all of the following categories:

- ❖ Critical Area Trees
- Trees within Parks and Open Spaces
- ❖Street Trees / Public Trees
- Tree Preservation During Land Development (Undeveloped Parcels)
- ❖ Fees and Fines





Tree Retention (Chapter 18.31)

To the extent practical, existing healthy significant trees shall be retained. Preservation of groups of significant trees, rather than individual trees shall be preferred. All grading shall take place outside the drip line of those significant trees to be retained, except that the city engineer may approve grading within the drip line if it can be demonstrated that such grading can occur without damaging the tree or trees.



WHAT APPROACH WOULD BE BEST?

Camas (Current)

To the extent practical, existing healthy significant trees shall be retained. Preservation of groups of significant trees, rather than individual trees shall be preferred.

% of trees must be preserved	No	30 tree units per acre
Requires planting to meet % goal	No	Yes
Perimeter trees – retain / plant	Generally as buffers between zones, and around parking lots	Yes
New trees required on private lot?	No	Yes, if less than 30 tree units
Street Trees Required?	Yes	Yes
Fee In-Lieu? Tree Fund	No	Yes

CHAPTER 18.13 LANDSCAPING

- Modify scope section
- Add Instructions for tree surveys
- Add required tree units
- Parking lot trees. Reduce tree ratio,
 but increase planter area dimensions
- Mitigation plans and details will be within a manual, rather than code



WHO NEEDS TO COMPLY WITH TREE UNIT MINIMUMS?

Scope should include...?

- Define "Buildable area" to exclude right-of-way (street trees) and critical areas
- Residential developments (more than four units)
- Any commercial or industrial development
- Single family lots (not in a subdivision) that are over ½ acre in size
- Undeveloped properties (e.g. vacant or under utilized)
- Conversion permits



WHY ARE WE HERE TONIGHT?
